David's Tabernacle



Introduction: Why David's Tabernacle Matters

- David's life was marked by deep worship and desire for God's presence (1 Sam 13:14).
- When he became king, one of his first major acts was bringing the **Ark of the Covenant** back to Jerusalem (2 Saml 6:1–2).
- The New Testament Church is modeled after **David's Tabernacle**—not Moses', Solomon's, or Herod's (Acts 15:16; Amos 9:11–12).
- Understanding David's Tabernacle helps us live out intimate, authentic, accessible worship today and empowers us to do great things for God.

Point 1: David's Pursuit of God's Presence

- David's desire to honor God led him to retrieve the Ark, the symbol of God's presence (2 Samuel 6:3–5).
- Mistaken handling led to Uzzah's death and a pause in the plan (v. 6–7).
- Obed-Edom's house was **blessed** while hosting the Ark (v. 11–12), showing the power and favor of God's presence.

Point 2: Undignified, Wholehearted Worship

- David brought the Ark with reverence and exuberant worship, dancing with all his might (2 Samuel 6:14–15).
- He faced criticism from Michal but responded: "I will be even more undignified" (v. 21–22).
- Key worship words in Psalms show depth and nature of their worship:
 - Hallel (clamorous praise), Yadah (lifted hands), Zamar (music), Barak (kneeling)

Point 3: A Model for Worship and Church Today

- David introduced full-time musical worship: 288 musicians initially (1 Chronicles 25:1), 4,000 by Solomon's reign (1 Chronicles 23:5).
- His tabernacle had **no veil**, **no separation**, open access for all to God's presence (1 Chronicles 16:1–6).
- Acts 15 confirms the Church is patterned after David's model—praise, access, and presence, not ritual and sacrifice.
- Worship was also prophetic: they **prophesied with instruments** (1 Chronicles 25:1–3).

Conclusion & Life Applications

- We are now the Tabernacle of David—with direct, bold access to God through Jesus (Hebrews 10:19–22).
- **Praise is our sacrifice** today (Hebrews 13:15), our **strength** (Psa 18:2-3), and it is **central** to our identity and mission. Embrace heartfelt, unrestrained worship.
- God inhabits our praise (Psalm 22:3) and draws others through it (Isaiah 60:3).
